The Luiseño phrase of "MU YAQA" (Shoots/To Grow) was chosen to describe our new Recreation Program brochure because it reflects the early stage of growth that the Recreation Department is in. As we mature and continue to grow through service and collaboration with the membership, it is our intention to provide those programs the tribal community feels are essential to the health and growth of the reservation. RINCON RECREATION DEPARTMENT CLASSES

TULE BOAT MAKING

Float your boat (camping and floating the boat weekend TBA) Southern California Native people were watermen long before any outside culture came to this land. The Tule boat was the craft of choice and this time honored tradition is interesting as well as fun to build and float. Resembling a canoe, the boat is constructed of reeds or rushes native to the Luiseno lands, from a plant commonly known as the Tule or bulrush. The interior of the stems of this wetland plant is made up of a soft material containing air cells Bundles of these materials provide flotation. The bundles are usually bound with grape vine or dogbane, which can be cut wild in wooded areas. Come join us and learn about Tule gathering, boat building and race your boat at the next Tule boat competition.

BOW MAKING

It takes some degree of skill to make a good bow, but archery bow making can be very rewarding, learn the methods for making these important tools. For people who enjoy a challenge, archery bow making can be a lot of fun, and a good way to pass the time. It might come in handy too, if you ever find yourself trapped in the wild.

BASKET MAKING

Coiling Basket classes will begin later in the Spring of 2011 and will run through the balance of the year. Come learn to gather and coil baskets in the traditional ways. The first day of class will be a "gathering" with the location to be determined." Please bring your clippers to gather the Juncus for weaving your basket (if you do not attend gathering class, a materials fee of \$25 per person will apply). All other classes will be in the Rincon Tribal Hall, from 5pm to 8pm. Space is limited (preference to Rincon members), please sign up early.

LANGUAGE

Cham'teela class runs continuously throughout the year and is held every Tuesday evening from 5:00 – 8:00 pm with a pot luck (space is limited, preference to Rincon members). Verna Arviso and Stanley "Boogie," Calac will instruct in Luiseno language, practice speaking and vocabulary, class will include song and dance. Class ends for Christmas break, then resumes Jan 11, 2011

CORDAGE MAKING

Making cord, rope and string from many different fibers including (Bast) Dogbane, Milkweed, Nettles, Hemp, Flax; (Leaves) Cattail, Yucca, Agave, Douglas Iris; (Bark) Willow, Maple, Basswood, Cedar; Leather Root, Beach Lupine; (Whole stem) Tule, straw, Juncus. Each material has specific requirements for extracting and preparing the fibers, but there are only two basic ways for using the fibers to make a cord: braiding (or plaiting) and twining. Braiding was usually done with flat, split materials such as cattail or flattened straw (this class is required for Tule boat making)

YOUTH WRESTLING CLUB

The Rincon Recreation Department, in conjunction with All Tribes Charter School, are working together to offer a wrestling program for boys and girls ages 5-13. The club is committed to teaching the great sport of wrestling as well as sportsmanship. The club focuses on teaching proper fundamental skills and encourages participation at tournaments all over San Diego County to as far East as Las Vegas. Tournaments are held on Sunday's, January—March. Wrestling is an individual sport that fosters self confidence, discipline, and hard work while still being a member of a team. ROCK ART

Come learn the signs and symbols of your past. Local sites and stories of what rock art was used for, how and why this tradition came to be will be discussed. Learn to differentiate between symbol, petro glyph, pictograph, and rock art. Interpret rock art to illustrate its importance in the cultural heritage of the Luiseno people and as a tool for learning about the past. Evaluate the importance of protecting rock art for your future.

CLAY POTS

Come work with Luiseno Artisans and gather the special red clay from local lands for making traditional California Indian pottery. This special red dirt represents the raw product, and your will make and fire the ollas, which represent the finished product. Learn the clay making techniques for coiled and flat shaped pot making, and methods for pit fire in the traditional Indian way as it has been accomplished for thousands of years in California.

CULTURE CLASSES

January 2011 we have scheduled Gourd Art and Gourd Rattles with Birdsongs. Basket making will be done in both weaving and coiling methods, as well as cordage making from various fibers to make rope for the Tule boats, bows and tools. We will learn how to find the wood to make rabbit sticks. Learn where to find clay to make ollas. Gathering acorns for Wewish making. Learn to identify native plants and foods as well as rock art viewing will be offered in Winter, Spring and Summer 2011. Each section of classes will have a day of gathering to learn and practice the traditions of our people and the skillful ways they handled daily life and their environments. All classes are free, but materials fees may apply. Classes are offered to all communities and Rincon Tribal members always have priority. Watch for the location of classes and schedules in the next newsletter or come by the Rincon Museum for more info.

RINCON RECREATION DEPARTMENT SPORTS INFORMATION

BALL FIELD RESERVATION POLICY

The three (3) softball fields the tribe currently has are available for the memberships use. The Tribal Council modified the process and fee schedule to allow for easier access to the facilities. The process now entails a 3-tier system which provides for recreational use of the ball fields at no cost to the members. However, if a member requests use of the fields for an event or tournament, rental fees will be charged (but at a much lower rate than non-members). All members are required to fill out and submit a "Facility Use Form" to reserve the fields at least 30 days in advance of the requested date of use. No fees are assessed for recreational use (parties, pick-up games), and just the reservation form is required. If lights are as part of your recreational use, then a Recreation Department staff person will be there to turn the lights on and off. All users are required to pick-up after their event and dispose of all trash. Please contact the Rincon Recreation Department for more information.

BASKETBALL COURTS

The outdoor basketball court is always open for the membership to use. Lights are provided and can be activated manually by the user of the court by turning the timer on. The timer is located on the Northwest pole just outside the court. All users are asked to please remove all trash and debris from the court when finished. Please report any unsafe conditions or maintenance concerns to the Rincon Recreation Department for corrective action.

BATTING CAGES

Both Softball and Baseball pitching machines are available for Rincon Members to use free of charge. The cages are available on a first come first serve basis for the Rincon Membership. A request form will need to be submitted to the Recreation Department one week in advance. For youth teams, or individuals 18 & under, an adult must be present. All users are required to collect the balls and return them to the buckets provided. No Food, Drinks, Gum or Seeds are allowed in the batting cages. Any costs for repairs or replacement of equipment will be the responsibility of the user. Batting cages will be available until 10:00 pm.

KEEPING PARKS SAFE

All members are encouraged to report any damaged or unsafe conditions of tribal property which include the ball fields, water feature, basketball court, public restrooms, tribal hall, security lights, play ground equipment, park benches, etc., to the Recreation Department. We will make sure your concerns and requests are forwarded to the proper department for repair or maintenance. By working together to keep our facilities and equipment in good and safe working order we are ensuring the safety of our youth and prolonging the usefulness of the investment made in that equipment. Please notify us on any unsafe conditions or concerns.



INTER TRIBAL SPORTS

Inter Tribal Sports (ITS) is a nonprofit organization established to unify tribal youth and communities through structured athletic programs. The vision of ITS is to have all tribal communities involved in quality organized events and programs. ITS is committed to ensuring that all participants have the necessary resources and facilities. Rincon youth have been participating in ITS programs since 2004. ITS provides annual youth programs for ages 8-18 in flag football, basketball, and softball. Archery is a program that will see it's way into the ITS program in the near future. During the past year alone over 500 Indian youth on 72 different teams, from 15 tribal communities in Southern California participated in the ITS program. The Rincon Band proudly supports the ITS organization and encourages all youth to participate.

VOLUNTEER COACHES

The Rincon Band of Luiseño Indians participates in youth sports leagues provided through Inter Tribal Sports. Teams are formed for youth between the ages of 8-18. ITS provides all uniforms, site supervision and game equipment. However, without volunteer coaches for flag football, basketball, and softball, Rincon youth cannot participate in these beneficial programs. If you would like to become a volunteer coach please contact the Rincon Recreation Dept.

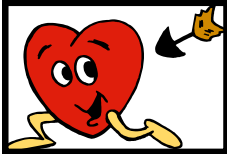

EPA

Each year, two (2) reservation wide clean-up days are sponsored by the EPA Department, utilizing Federal grant dollars to assist Tribal Members in disposing of household hazardous waste and other debris. All clean-ups will be held on Saturdays between 8:00 am and 1:00 pm at the 14 acres. Tribal Members are encouraged to bring solid waste, green waste, electric waste (e-waste), motor oil, tires, as well as their household hazardous waste products (pesticides, batteries, paint, florescent lights, etc.) , For more information contact the EPA Department at 760-297-2632.
